Rotary and the Chamber of Commerce, all of whom contribute to the essential fabric of Tenafly.

And most significantly, thank you to all the resident volunteers that serve on the numerous Boards and Committees that invest their time improving our community.

The most important idea to practice when we find ourselves elected to the roles we are in, is to always serve the public in ways which produces the most direct benefit to their daily lives, while also planning for the future.

Road improvements, park beautification, recreation opportunities, senior services and downtown improvements will continue as priorities for 2024.

The initial steps for installing a proper traffic signal at the corner of Dean Drive and East Clinton Avenue are already underway.

Storm water is a major challenge, not just for Tenafly, but the entire northern valley region. We are engaged with our County and State partners on a regional level to improve our storm water management.

Locally, we are working to clean our streams, add storm drains where it is most effective, and keep our existing storm drains free from debris.

We have approved the renovation and upscaling of three buildings on West Railroad Avenue. A new restaurant recently opened on Washington Street and two new restaurant projects are underway. We will continue to encourage small business entrepreneurs to invest in our community.

Coordinating with the Police Department, we are working on pedestrian safety upgrades including reviewing crossing guard locations, adding crosswalks, and testing the usage of speed bumps as a traffic calming measure.

Thank you to Governor Murphy for taking the

time to administer the oath of office to me this year. The Governors presence is a demonstration of the State's commitment to our community and the importance of positive working relationships.

As your Mayor, I will continue to build relationships for the benefit of our community.

Because of our relationships with professionals and government funding sources we were able to rebuild storm damaged roads, and a bridge, faster and less costly than surrounding communities. Utilizing the American Rescue Money Tenafly received from the Federal government we have been able to fund the beginning phase of our downtown improvements.

The Council and I encourage you to bring ideas to us. Join committees and participate in town-wide activities. Attend Council meetings. This is your town, and please remember that the decisions are made by the people who show up.

I would like to wish everyone a prosperous and healthy 2024.

WINTER WEATHER INFORMATION AND GUIDANCE

The Tenafly Police Department would like to remind residents of some winter weather related rules, responsibilities and safety tips.

Tenafly Borough Code requires property owners to clear snow from all public sidewalks on their property boundaries within 12 hours of daylight after the last snowfall. When clearing snow, please do not discard snow from your property into the street. Doing so only makes the job of plowing the roads more difficult for our hard-working Department of Public Works. In addition, please help our volunteer firefighters by clearing snow from around all fire hydrants on your property. When every second counts, an obstructed fire hydrant will delay firefighters from accessing water to put out a fire. Please clear your fire hydrants of snow as soon as possible.

For those that drive, New Jersey traffic law requires all vehicles traveling on the roadways of the state to be free of snow and ice. A clear windshield improves your visibility and brushing off your car's hood and roof prevents snow and ice from being dislodged and striking other vehicles or obstructing your view. Take the time and thoroughly clear your car of ALL snow and ice before you hit the road.

Don't let a snow-covered roadway ruin your trip. Always understand the limits of your vehicle and your own driving skills when operating on snow and ice covered roadways. First, you will need to decrease your speed to maintain control over your vehicle on snow-covered roads. In addition to decreasing speed, you should also increase your following distance to provide more room to safely stop for pedestrians, stop signs, red lights, or other unforeseen hazards. Plan your trips accordingly and allot extra time to reach your destination when driving in inclement weather conditions. Finally, beware of the false sense of security that many drivers get when operating allwheel (AWD) or 4-wheel (4WD) drive vehicles. Both drive systems enable equipped vehicles to start from a stopped position and to propel themselves through snow, ice and other slippery terrain, but they don't make the vehicle invincible. All vehicles will slide and loose traction on ice and snow - especially when stopping abruptly or navigating turns at unsafe speeds.

Please follow these rules and recommendations to make the community safer for all of us.



Don't be this guy...and don't laugh. We've seen it.



Not cool, man. I'm not sure what this guy thinks he can see through that small hole in the snow and ice. What do I see? I see him getting a ticket. Take the few extra minutes to clean your car off completely. Windshield, roof, hood, and trunk...it all needs to be cleared off to prevent flying snow and ice from hitting other cars or dislodging and obstructing your view. And, yes, we've seen this type of ridiculousness too many times to count.



Nicely done! Borough Code requires that all property owners clear your public sidewalks of snow and ice within 12 hours of first daylight after the last snow fall.

Borough Code requires that you clear your fire hydrant within 24 hours of the last snowfall. Please do your part and help our volunteer firefighters keep our community safe.

VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT





The popularity of electric bikes and electric scooters (e-bikes and e-scooters) has taken off over the past few years. Lithium-ion batteries are usually the source of power for both, and if not used correctly, or if damaged, those batteries can catch on fire or explode. Whether you use e-bikes or e-scooters as your main way of getting around, or just for fun, there are important safety tips to keep in mind when charging or storing these devices.

The Problem

- Damaged or defective batteries can overheat, catch fire, or explode.
- Lithium-ion battery fires give off toxic gases and they burn extremely hot.

Safety Tips

- Only purchase and use devices, batteries, and charging equipment that are listed by a nationally recognized testing lab and labeled accordingly.
- Always follow the instructions from the manufacturer.
- Only use the battery and the charger that were designed for, and came with, the device.
- Do not keep charging the device or device battery after it is fully charged.
- Only charge one device or device battery at a time to prevent overloading the circuit.
- Keep batteries at room temperature when possible. Do not charge them at temperatures below 32°F (0°C) or above 105°F (40°C).
- Do not store batteries in direct sunlight or inside hot vehicles, and keep them away from children and liquids.
- Store e-bikes, e-scooters, and batteries away from exit doors and anything that can get hot or catch fire.
- Only have device repairs performed by a qualified professional.
- Do not put lithium-ion batteries in the trash. Recycling is always the best option. Take the batteries to a battery recycling location or contact your local waste department for disposal instructions.

Signs of a Problem

Stop using the e-bike or e-scooter if you notice any of these problems with the battery: unusual odor, change in color, too much heat, change in shape, leaking, smoking, or not keeping a charge.

Along with spring cleaning, lets take the time to make sure our homes and family are safe from the threat of fire.

Here is a check list you should go over with your family:

- ★ Working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in reported home fires in half
 - Ensure smoke alarms are installed inside every bedroom, outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home, including the basement
 - Test them at least once a month by pushing the test button
 - Replace the batteries in all smoke alarms. Best way to remember is when you change your clocks, change your batteries.
- ★ The leading cause of home clothes dryer fires is failure to clean them.
 - Clean the lint filter before or after each load of laundry. Remove lint that has collected around the drum.
 - Keep the area around your dryer clear of things that can burn, like boxes, cleaning supplies and clothing.
- ★ Most cooking fires in the home involve the stovetops
 - Keep anything that can catch fire oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels, or curtains away from your stovetops.
 - Always stay in the kitchen when frying on the stovetop.
- ★ Extension cord fires outnumbered fires beginning with permanent or detachable power cords by two-to-one.
 - Check electrical cords to make sure they are not running across doorways or under carpets. Extension cords are intended for temorary use.
 - Have a qualified electrician add more receptacle outlets so you don't have to use extension cords.

RESPIRATORY ILLNESS

Respiratory illness is one present that you can't return but they will keep on giving if you let them! Don't be the reason others get this unwanted gift this winter season! You can prevent respiratory illnesses by following these 8 easy steps.

1. Cover Your Coughs and Sneezes!

Do not cough or sneeze into your hands! Instead, use a tissue or sleeve to cover the cough or sneeze. Droplets from coughs and sneezes can travel up to 6 feet and contain pathogens that cause illnesses such as influenza (flu), COVID-19, or respiratory syncytial virus (RSV.)

2. Wash Your Hands!

Wash your hands, including the back of your hands and under your nails for at least 20 seconds with warm water and soap. Wash your hands after coughing, sneezing, or after touching high-touch areas such as doorknobs or railings. If you are unable to wash your hands use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.

3. Stay Home!

Stay home if you are sick or stay away from others if they are sick to prevent the spread of the illness.

4. Get Vaccinated!

Stay up to date on vaccines such as flu, COVID-19, RSV, and pneumonia to reduce the risk of infection and severe illness!

5. Don't Touch!

Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth. Do not touch your face with unwashed hands, especially after touching a high-touch area.

6. **Clean and Disinfect!** Clean and disinfect s

Clean and disinfect surfaces and objects that are touched often such as doorknobs, railings, and countertops.

7. Get Fresh Air!

Open windows, go outside, or use air filters, when possible, to increase fresh air in the home, office, or school.

8. Talk to Your Health Care Provider!

Talk to your healthcare provider about respiratory illness prevention. Ask about your specific health risks.

MULCH YOUR LEAVES AN ENVIRONMENTALLY FRIENDLY ALTERNATIVE TO REMOVING LEAVES

What is Mulching & How Can I Mulch?

Mulching is a way to dispose of leaves by shredding them, rather than removing the leaves from your lawn. Mulching is a better way to protect your lawn and help prevent some of the soil erosion from stormwater. You can do this yourself or ask your landscaper.

The leaf shredding steps are as easy as 1-2-3.

- 1. **Collect** all the leaves ON to your lawn.
- 2. **"Mulch Mow"** Mow the lawn with a "mulching mower" to shred the leaves to bits and pieces. You remove the grass catcher on your lawn mower and then raise the blades an inch or so higher. This technique, mulch mowing, is quick and easy.

TIP: Raise the mower deck to the highest level on the first pass. It may require two passes with the mower.

3. **Put the mulch back** where it will help your lawn. The shredded leaves decompose and then act as a natural fertilizer and weed control agent. Put this newly formed mulch back into tree and mulch beds in your garden. This natural process will build new soil, increase biological activity and growth and you'll save a fortune on mulch. You won't have to buy mulch or weed control products!

Tip: If you mulch over grass, it can smother the grass especially if it is wet. So, pick a dry day and don't wait for a heavy buildup of leaves. This way, shredding is often easier on your machine. Lower the mower height and give it a final shred and mowing, and leave the results in place.

If you hire out, talk with your landscape contractor now so they are ready for fall! Almost all new professional lawnmowers have mulching blades so it's easy for them to adopt this new philosophy (if you ask for it) and it will save them a lot of money as well which is the best incentive.

How Can Mulching Help Save Money?

Mulching can save the town money on leaf collection. Every leaf season, our community expends significant energy and resources collecting leaves, turning those leaves into topsoil, and then having tons of quality topsoil removed from our leaf facility on Grove Street. Mulching can help reduce these costs.

Leaf Shredding is not just for the big fall leaf drop. It should be practiced year-round returning vital nutrients to the soil continuously which will also cut down on the need for expensive fertilizers.

Why the Concerns with Leaf Blowing?

Gas-powered leaf blowers can be a noisy addition to the neighborhood. Unfortunately, they can also have a negative impact on health, contributing to dirtier air quality. The chemical benzene, the pollutant PM2.5, and the carbon dioxide emissions associated with using gas-powered lawn equipment, make alternatives both quieter and cleaner.

Whereas electric blowers are quieter and do not emit the chemicals mentioned above, they also damage delicate ecosystems. Blowers destroy habitats for beneficial insects, snails, and birds – many of whom control invasive species like the lantern fly.

Please consider mulching to help yourself, your community, and the environment!

WATER COURSES AND DRAINAGE DITCHES

Residents are responsible for maintenance of streams, water courses and drainage ditches on their property.

Section 12-4 of the Borough Code details the maintenance responsibilities of property owners and residents. It is unlawful for any owner, tenant or occupant of any lot or tract of land across which there exists any drainage ditch, ravine, stream, culvert or other water source, to permit the accumulation of loose brush, fallen leaves, tree branches, dead trees, stumps, garbage, trash and/or other debris to the extent that such accumulation presents a risk of washing downstream thereby causing a blockage of said water course, and/or flooding or damaging of adjacent downstream properties.



The Tenafly Recycling & Convenience Center accepts all used clothing and shoe items for recycling. Residents may bring all of these items to the Tenafly Recycling & Convenience Center to be recycled. There is a Collection Box marked for these items. All items placed into these boxes are used, re-used or recycled into other items for use. Please consider donating these items. Residents will be provided the opportunity to observe their documents being shredded. All non-confidential, paper material should be recycled through the Tenafly curbside recycling program and will not be accepted at this event. Come out and take advantage of this convenient service for Borough residents.

DISPOSAL OF GARDEN DEBRIS, STORM DEBRIS, BRANCHES AND TREE LIMBS
