Mayor's Corner

You may have heard me say several times that I am extremely proud of our volunteer firefighters for the outstanding job they do to keep our community safe. As a firefighter myself, I know firsthand the dangers our emergency responders face, and the extreme dedication and commitment required of all firefighters who sign up for the job. The last few weeks were an extremely unusual and challenging time for the Fire Department with 3 major events—and our firefighters lived up to their commitment and managed to put out fires with no loss of human life.

On May 24th, a large fire broke out at a warehouse at 60 Enterprise Avenue. High flames and thick smoke quickly spread throughout the building. Firefighters from Jersey City, Lyndhurst, Rutherford, and Kearny pitched in and SFD declared the situation under control around 4pm. No one was hurt during this incident.

On June 20th, a major brush fire in the marsh close to NJ Turnpike South between 15X and 16E snarling vehicular traffic and halted train traffic. The fire, fueled by extreme dry conditions, raged for several hours, with thick smoke being visible for miles. The Secaucus Fire Department, assisted by the

New Jersey Forest Fire Service declared the fire extinguished at about 5:00 PM, two hours after it was first reported.

The very next day, on June 21st, the Secaucus Fire Department responded to a report of fire at 252 Maple Street. The fire severely

damaged the contents of the two-family home, but the SFD's quick response avoided serious injury to any of the tenants occupying the home. The tenants, who lost almost everything they had, are now looking to start anew.

The outside temperature for the fires in June approached 100 degrees, which made for brutal firefighting conditions. In all three of these major fires, the Secaucus Fire Department came out in force, called upon their training, and risked their lives to ensure the safety of others. On behalf of the Town Council and residents, I thank each and every one of our volunteer firefighters who keep us safe. We are forever grateful for your service.

Blessing of the Fleet at the Coast Guard Auxiliary

Do you know that Secaucus is home to the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla 10-2? The pier located on the Hackensack River off Meadowlands Parkway hosted the annual Blessing of the Fleet of the Secaucus Auxiliary on June 15th, which was presided by Father Victor Kennedy, and attended by the members of the Auxiliary, Police and Fire

Departments as well as Town Council members. Auxiliaries across the nation support the Coast Guard with classroom instruction at the ramp and pier, and operate 1,800 vessels, 160 aircraft and 1,400 radio facilities. Auxiliary members conduct safety patrols on local waterways, assist in Search and Rescue, teach boating safety



classes, conduct free vessel safety checks for the public, provide boating safety literature to dealers, as well as many other activities related to recreational boating safety. The Town of Secaucus is happy to be home to such a worthy organization.
