### Mayor's Corner

A very special milestone is coming up for our Town-we will be celebrating Secaucus' 125th anniversary next year! A milestone this big deserves a grand celebration, a day when our residents can come together and celebrate the most enduring characteristic—a strong community with a sense of pride. The event will tentatively take place on Saturday, May 31, 2025, so save the date!

You may know that Secaucus has gone through several transformations since it's early settlement way back in the early 1700s. For a long time, the area was part of Bergen, one of the oldest municipalities in New Jersey. Secaucus was formed as a borough in 1900 from portions of North Bergen and was eventually incorporated as a town in 1917.

We are now a beautiful suburb, literally a stone's throw away from the most popular city in the world and it is hard to imagine that Secaucus was originally a flourishing agricultural community. Our Town was once famous for orchid and celery farms, and one of our residents, Sebastian Meisch was even known as Celery King. In the early 1900s, Secaucus started becoming known for its burgeoning pig farms. At one point, there were more than 50 farms in this small area. That is

one of the reasons, why vou will find so many pig-related décor items in my office!

By 1950, pig farms were gone, partially due to the Turnpike using up land from 11 farms, and later due to a court order shutting down all pig farms. I am fascinated with



how Secaucus has reinvented itself again and again. With the Turnpike in and pig farms out, Secaucus once again re-invented itself with much-needed warehouses and outlet malls. And when outlets went out of fashion, data centers took their place.

Throughout all these changes, I hear a constant-that Secaucus residents love living in this Town! They love the community feel and unity; and they take pride in this beautiful "Jewel of the Meadowlands." Let's celebrate this and more throughout next year as we celebrate the 125th anniversary.

### **Secaucus Procures New Bus**

**for Senior Trips** Great news for seniors! The Town of Secaucus received a new senior transportation bus thanks to NJ Transit and the Federal Transit Administration! The grant-funded, 28-seater bus can be changed to the 2 wheelchairs-24 seats configuration when needed.

"This is one more improvement that is entirely funded by grants. The need for a new bus for senior trips is fulfilled without an impact on our budget, thanks to NJ Transit", said Mayor Michael Gonnelli. "Our seniors will love the cushioned seats and smoother ride. And having the flexibility to have 2 wheelchairs is a big plus," said Lisa Snedeker, Director of Senior Services. The new bus will replace an older one and will be utilized for senior trips to stores, restaurants, malls, health classes, special events and more.

#### Historical Plaque on Paterson Plank Road Unveiled

Did you know Paterson Plank Road was a main throughfare for people traveling west from New York to Paterson, New Jersey? For more than 200 years, the cobbled stone and wooden plank road was heavily used by travelers. The street was fortified by stone walls on either side to prevent flooding—some of the original walls still stand and you can see them between

Huber Street and Hops Lane. A plaque commemorating those walls was installed in August and was unveiled on August 23. Seen in pic at the unveiling are Councilmember John Gerbasio, Museum Directors Scott Schaffer, Anna Schwarz, Tom Schwarz, Mayor Michael Gonnelli and Councilmember James Clancy.

#### 3 Police Officers Promoted; 3 New Officers Sworn In

The Secaucus Police Department is expanding! Members of the Secaucus Police Department and their families, joined Chief Dennis Miller to



congratulate 3 officers on their promotion and 2 new officers who were sworn in at a Promotion and Swearing-in Ceremony held at Town Hall in July.

Captain Martin Moreda, a 22-year veteran, joined SPD in 2008 as a patrolman and rose up the ranks to Captain. He was an instrumental part in creating the Traffic Bureau in Secaucus. He is a certified crash reconstructionist and has earned several awards including two for Excellent Police Service, two Unit Citations and a Jersey City Mayoral Award.

Lieutenant Mark Valentino, a 24-year veteran at the SPD served the Patrol Division, and later, as the property and evidence custodian. He earned several prestigious awards including the medal of Honor, NJSPBA

Gold Medal of Valor Award, and the 200 Club of Hudson County Valor Award. He is a member of the NJ Police Honor Legion and has also been recognized as the Officer of the Year by Knights of Columbus.



Sergeant Taylor Ensmann has been at the SPD for 10 years. He is credited with starting New Jersey's first K-9 Therapy Program after certifying his canine companion Oakley. He is a board member of the Secaucus PBA and is the Local's State Delegate for the last four years. His awards include 1 for Excellent Police Service, and 3 Unit Citations.

#### Solemn 9-11 Ceremony Honors Our Lost Ones

On September 11th , the Town remembered its own loved ones lost on September 11, 2001. At a solemn ceremony held at the Memorial Plaza by the Secaucus Public Library, Town Council members, members of the Police Department, Fire Department and residents gathered to honor all the loved ones lost on the fateful day, 23 years ago. That included six of our own residents—Arlene Babakitis, Richard Cudina, Nancy Perez, Kenneth Simon, Steven Strobert and Michael Tanner. Brian Beckmeyer played the taps.

The impact on the families whose loved ones were untimely taken away is immeasurable. "It is important to remember the scale of loss and it is important to keep the memories of our loved ones alive," said Mayor Gonnelli. The reading of the names at the ceremony by Councilmembers Costantino and Dehnert brought tears to many eyes.

Councilman William McKeever spoke on behalf of Mayor Michael Gonnelli (who was unavailable due to personal matter) and reminded everyone about the magnitude of the loss. Nearly 3,000 lives were lost at World Trade Center in New York, the Pentagon in Washington DC, and in the plane crash in Shanksville, Pennsylvania. The ill-effects of that tragic day continue to this day with health-related issues faced by those who inhaled the dust at ground zero. Father Sergio and Pastor McCleary led the prayers. Frank Basile moved the attendees with his deep-voiced rendition of the national anthem.



This summer, 10 high school students and 4 chaperones traveled to Costa Rica to participate in the Hygiene Project's 11th Community Outreach Program (COP). The group stayed for 4 nights 5 days and embarked on educational, cultural, and humanitarian activities. The trip's highlights include multiple service projects such as cleaning up Siquirres Beach and painting a medical center in Pacquare. 150 hygiene kits, 30 snack bags, 300 lbs of non-perishable food, 48 plush toys, and 250 school supplies were donated to 30 migrant children at the Salvation Army in San Jose, 65 indigenous Cabecar students at Namaldi's elementary school, and 15 homeless individuals in Bataan. They all had the opportunity to play games with and become friends with the children, strengthening their sense of empathy and understanding for them. The group witnessed firsthand the conditions of different struggling populations in another

country and returned home content with the positive impact they had made with their service and gained a lifetime changing experience.
